## 2009 TAX BILLS ARRIVING SOON

Your 2009 tax bill will be mailed within the next couple days. Enclosed with it will be the 2010 garbage/recycling calendar, dog license application and information, mill rate comparisons and tax collection information and hours.

If you qualify for a lottery credit, but did not receive a credit on your tax bill, contact the town office prior to submitting your tax bill payment.

Dog license fees are \$12.50 per neutered male or spayed female, \$17.50 for un-neutered male or un-spayed female, and \$42 per multiple licenses (kennels). Dog license are due by April 1, 2010 or an additional \$5 will be charged per license. A list of items needed to apply for a dog license will be enclosed with your tax bill. ## **PAPERWORK FOR TOWN BOARD CANDIDATES DUE JANUARY 5**

Two of the five Town board seats, #3 and #4 currently held by Jim Laubmeier and Sue Studz, are up for election next April. Jim Laubmeier plans to run for another term. Sue Studz will not seek reelection.

To become a candidate for either of these positions, request a registration packet from Clerk Brenda Kahl. Sign a declaration of candidacy. Collect signatures from at least 20 Town residents and turn them in to the Town Clerk by January 5. The process is neither difficult nor time consuming.

## **BOARD TO DISCUSS PROMOTING ALTERNATIVE AG IN BERRY**

After a slow transition from a farming community to a majority exurban community, the Town of Berry, in its comprehensive plan, wants to stay rural. With a cap on the number of residences in the Town at approximately 1000, after all of the splits are taken, the average Berry property owner will own 20 to 25 acres. For someone in difficult economic straits, this acreage could become an unaffordable private park.

Given Berry's wish to remain rural, and with the County's creation for the A-4 small lot agricultural district intended for small 5-35 acre lots in exclusive agricultural use, and with diversified ag being one of Thrive's (the 8-county regional economic develop group) target sectors, smaller parcels could provide economic gain to their owners, provide more stable ag land tenure for the Town as a whole, and help support regional economic development goals.

At its December meeting, the Board will discuss whether it is appropriate and feasible for the Town to take an active role in helping foster diverse agriculture opportunities in the town. –*Sue Studz*

## **FALSE ALARMS COULD COST YOU**

Beginning in March, 2010, if you have a false alarm from your security system either at home or at your workplace, you may be fined by the Cross Plains/Berry fire district. It was agreed at the last fire district meeting to assess fines for two or more false alarms in any 12-month period. Currently an increase in the number of false alarms is costing the fire district time and money.

Before the new policy takes effect, the Berry Board will have to agree to it. The practice may begin after the February Fire district meeting.

## BERRY BOARD PASSES DARK SKY ORDINANCE

At its November meeting, the Berry Board passed a “Dark Sky” ordinance regulating exterior lighting in the Town. The purpose of the ordinance is to promote the preservation of dark skies over the Town of Berry and to protect the view of the night sky for the enjoyment of the citizens of the Town.

While the ordinance will apply mostly to new construction (current lighting is “grandfathered”), replacement lighting will need to meet the guidelines. The goal is to be able to see the light, not the bulbs, so replacement of non dark-sky fixtures will need to be done with dark sky fixtures, dark sky cutoff fixtures, or non dark-sky fixtures with dark sky shades or shields.

The ordinance applies to all outdoor lighting within the Town, with the exceptions of emergency lighting, temporary lighting, vehicular lighting, and lighting on wheeled farm machines. –*Sue Studz*

## TOWN CHARGES FARMER FOR ROAD DAMAGE

Under Town ordinances 300.2 and 100.2, a Berry farmer has been invoiced more than \$1,000 by the Town for costs for repairing road damage resulting from exceeding road weight limits by manure hauling on a Town road last spring. Remember that the weight limits that apply to commercial vehicles apply to farm vehicles as well.

## BEAVER DAM COMES TO BERRY

Early last month, the banks of Halfway Prairie Creek overflowed into the Town’s new Kahl Halfway Prairie Creek Park. Reports were that the wildflower area and pond were flooding.

A careful walk-through of the park showed that the playing field did not flood and the pond was overflowing where it would be expected to flow after a good spring thaw. The wetlands were, well, quite wet.

The creek overflow problem was solved with the help of a local trapper working in concert with the DNR. Apparently, at least two beavers were responsible for damming up the creek. Earlier in the year, a muskrat was thought to be responsible for draining the pond by tunneling through to the creek. Ah, the ebbs and flows of restoring natural habitat.

## BOARD ADOPTS POLICY REGARDING ASSESSMENTS AND REVALUATIONS

Responding to recent revaluation confusions and concerns, the Berry Board has adopted a policy to improve communications with citizens regarding the assessment process, what assessment terms such as property categories mean, and how to challenge inappropriate valuations effectively.

Per the new policy, the Town will require the Assessor to:

1. Send the Town Clerk all valuation information at least four days before sending the information to the property owners.
2. Schedule Open Book at least one week after publication of the next regular town newsletter following distribution of valuation information to town property owners.
3. Broaden comparable sales to include those in adjacent towns for assessment of properties.
4. Both notices sent to property owners and the draft assessment role shall include, in addition to all information required by statute, a listing of acreage, improvements and valuation for each class of property on each parcel.

The Town will:

1. Include a detailed description of the valuation process in the newsletter, at the time the revaluation is to begin.
2. Include a detailed description of why the revaluation is necessary, how the valuation affects taxes, how to determine if the relative (as opposed to absolute) valuation of a particular parcel has changed and how to challenge perceived inaccurate valuations effectively. This description should include information on how to approach the Assessor at the Open Book and how to prepare a case for the Board of Review, including examples.
3. Attempt to avoid revaluations during periods when the rate of change in property values is changing substantially, if possible.

## **GOOD NEIGHBOR AND TRAILS SUBCOMMITTEE NEWS**

Last month's Trails subcommittee and Good Neighbor Committee meetings were held in the Rosemary Garfoot Public Library with some twenty attending.

The Trails agenda began with four guest speakers relating their points for having this trail go forward. All speakers mentioned the great effects for the areas and talked about having this great recreation trail. None mentioned the fact that the trail would also be used as a transportation corridor for getting to work, to a store or getting some traffic off the roadways.

Again it was brought to the front that having a multi-modal trail could benefit areas with closely located retail.

For the Town of Berry, agriculture was the biggest driver. The horse section of the trail might stimulate smaller plots of land for horse farms and thereby help create markets for hay and other types of feed.

It was also mentioned that once the trail was in place and well used, it might attract other businesses involved with this type of trail to our area.

Once again, the trail maps were not set out for GNC members to look at and share their thoughts on land use and trail selection. Nor was there any mention of costs or funding sources.

The Good Neighbor Committee spent their meeting time reviewing accomplishments over the last year and suggesting goals to accomplish in the coming year.

The Village of Cross Plains distributed their official map with some revisions on it and announced that the village was trying to have a public meeting in January or February, 2010.

Wisconsin DOT and Transmart Technologies are planning an open house on the results of the studies of the Highway 14 corridor. With WisDOT having less money to work with, their mindset seems to have changed from building new roads to repairing old corridors and making them safer.

There will be no meetings in December. The next meeting will be on January 20<sup>th</sup> in the Village of Mazomanie. Exact location and times TBA.

## **NEW “CONVERSION FEES” FOR LAND ZONED OUT OF A1-EX**

The Department of Ag Trade and Consumer Protection's (DATCP's) new Working Lands Initiative establishes new “conversion fees” for land zoned out of A1-Ex Agriculture. Fees are three times the per acre value of the highest value category of tillable cropland in the village or town in which the rezoned land is located.

The average conversion fee in Dane County will be \$975 per acre. Most likely an additional \$55 per acre fee will be charged to cover the administrative expenses associated with DATCP's new initiative.

Dane County will implement the conversion fees on applicable Zoning Map Amendment petitions starting on January 1, 2010. Applications completed in 2009 will not be charged the conversion fee. If you are considering re-zoning out of A1-Ex, there may be a financial benefit to applying by the end of December.

## IMPORTANT FIRE SAFETY TIPS

The heating season and the holidays are upon us, and that means furnaces, fireplaces, stoves, candles, and other sources of fire will be used more frequently. A fire in a rural area, like here in Berry, is often quite destructive, as the distances make fire department response times longer. So here are some steps that we can all take to reduce the risk of a house fire, and to prepare for one if it occurs.

**Have a fire escape plan and practice it:** discuss with your family how you would escape your home if a fire blocked one or more main exits. Practice escaping from your home, particularly if you have children or less able adults in your family. Agree on a safe place for your family to gather.

**Install smoke detectors on all levels** of your home. Test monthly and replace batteries every six months. Equip your home with Type ABC fire extinguishers. Install a sprinkler system – this could be the difference between damage to and complete destruction of your home.

**Have your furnace tested and inspected yearly** by a qualified technician. Have your fireplaces, woodstoves, and chimneys inspected yearly and cleaned if needed. Keep all flammable materials, such as clothing, paper, gasoline, furniture, and draperies away from open flames or intense heat sources, such as lamps and space heaters.

**Keep an eye on your cooking.** Store flammable materials at least 3 feet away from the cooktop. Never use an oven or grill to heat your home. Keep grills and turkey fryers at least 3 feet away from your house, and never use one in a garage or below an overhang.

**Do not overload electrical circuits or extension cords** or use electrical appliances with worn cords. Never leave smoking materials unattended. Never let a candle or oil lamp burn unattended. Do not allow your children or pets to be near sources of fire unattended. Store matches and lighters where children cannot reach.
