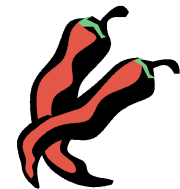

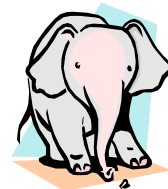

HAVE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE YET?

Residents must register in the clerk's office or at the polling place on Election Day for the February 16 Primary. Mail-in registration deadline was January 27. You must provide proof of residence.

Acceptable forms of proof of residence are:

- A current and valid Wisconsin driver's license
- A current and valid Wisconsin ID card
- A university, college or technical institute identification card or fee card that contains a photograph of the cardholder
- Any other official identification card or license issued by a Wisconsin governmental body
- An identification card issued by an employer on the normal course of business and bearing a photo of the card holder, but not including a business card
- A residential lease which is effective for a period that includes election day (excludes registering by mail)
- A real estate tax bill or receipt for the current year or the year preceding the date of the election
- A cable TV, gas, electric, telephone or other utility statement for the period commencing no earlier than 90 days before election day
- A bank statement, current paycheck, or check or other document issued by a unit of government.

ROSEMARY GARFOOT LIBRARY NEWS

Monday evenings, from 5:30 – 8:00, a distant happy sound of music, singing and playing, can be heard in the main room of the Rosemary Garfoot Public Library in Cross Plains. A group gets together here weekly to make music, sing, play acoustic instruments, and generally enjoy themselves. Organized by the Town of Berry's own, Judy Laubmeier, the group includes singers, musicians at all levels of skill, old and young. Members of the group bring in sheets with words and chords of song to share (the library copier is available to provide copies for those who want them).

Usually the group meets in the Children's room (with the door closed), and all are free to listen, sing along, or bring an instrument and join in. Instruments so far represented are: guitar, fiddle, banjo, harmonica, and simple rhythm instruments.

The Library has just ended one of its busiest years ever; with almost 94,000 items checked out, 56,000 items loaned to other libraries, and over 18,400 computer sessions provided. Many of the computer sessions involved email, job searches, and filling out employment applications. The library programs included educational film events, Senior Thursdays at the Movies, Eco-Talk Book Group, Fiction Book Club, Library Tours, computer classes, and more.

There will be a change in the time of the children's story hour in February. The babies' story/song/fingerplay and book time remains on Tuesday at 10am (February 16th and 23rd, March 2nd and 9th). But the bigger preschoolers will change to Friday at 9:30am. The theme will be pets; with Dogs on February 19th, Cats on the 26th, Fish on March 5th and Unusual Pets on the 12th.

This year the library will continue to focus on environmental programs, computer classes, and book discussion groups. Other programs will also be offered throughout the year. Check the library newsletter or website for further information at: <http://www.rgpl.org>

DID YOU KNOW?

WISDOT RELEASES US14 CORRIDOR DRAFT REPORT

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) has completed a draft report for the US 14 Corridor Study (East), focusing on the Highway 14 corridor located between WIS 78 and US 12 (Mazomanie to Middleton). Access the roughly 200 page report at <http://www.US14studyeast.com/>.

The report examines and compiles environmental, social and transportation issues, and other data that will be considered in future transportation decisions. In addition to serving as a central clearinghouse for information, the study includes traffic safety and operational analyses that form the basis for strategies and long-term access management plans. The goal is preservation: finding ways to extend the useful life for the existing facility for as long as possible.

The scope of the study does not include capacity expansion or bypasses. While the *Connections 2030* plan includes expansion, the state legislature has not authorized WisDOT to study capacity improvements.

The report contains specific proposed intersection improvements at Carya Road, Scherbel, South Valley and others. –Sue Studz

FEBRUARY IS PRUNING TIME

Late winter is the perfect time to prune your trees and shrubs. Pruning trees and shrubs while they are dormant and before the sap is up is the least stressful time for them. The leafless conditions now are ideal for spotting damaged, diseased or rubbing limbs that need removing. Pruning in late winter also reduces the chance of spreading disease, such as oak wilt, caused by an insect borne fungus.

There are a few trees and shrubs that are exceptions to the February pruning rule. Lilacs and other early bloomers should be pruned after they are done flowering to give you an opportunity to enjoy their wonderful color and scent. You may also wish to prune maples, birches, dogwoods and elms mid-summer to avoid excess spring sap leakage. Call a professional arborist to remove heavy limbs, limbs near power lines or any pruning tasks that can't be done from the ground.

BERRY'S GORST VALLEY HOPS RECEIVES AG DIVERSIFICATION AND DEVELOPMENT GRANT

Governor Doyle recently awarded a \$25,000 Agricultural Diversification and Development Grant to Gorst Valley Hops. Gorst Valley seeks to revitalize hops production in Wisconsin by designing equipment, offering processing services, and providing consulting and education to growers.

The grant program aims to stimulate the state's farm economy by finding new opportunities for farmers and agribusinesses. Grants provide early-stage funding for market research and development, new product R&D, and feasibility studies of new technologies and practices.

Other local grant recipients included the University of Wisconsin-Madison Horticulture Department (\$21,500 to study production and storage potential in Wisconsin for "cut and peel" carrots -- popular today, worth about five times as much to the grower as carrots grown for processing), and Cooperative Network, Madison, (\$25,000 for a feasibility study of locally-owned biomass production in Ashland).



TOWN HALL USE POLICY BEING AMMENDED TO ACCOMMODATE COMMUNITY GROUPS

Some residents have asked about using the Town Hall after business hours as a meeting place for regular gatherings such as a Berry knitting group or a Berry book club. Because of its easy access, parking, and ample space, the Hall is an ideal location.

Recognizing that the current policy & fee schedule for Town Hall use discourages these informal community gatherings, the Town Board, at its January meeting, voted to amend the Hall rental policy to enable the board flexibility in determining a special fee (if any) depending on the proposed use.

A refundable deposit will still need to be made (tied to checking out and returning the key), and groups must get Board approval. Groups will need to plan ahead, since the Board only meets monthly, on the 3rd Monday, and the request must be an agenda item. – Sue Studz

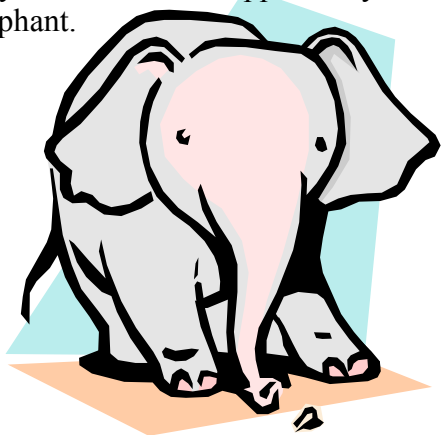

AUGUST BIKE RACE PROPOSED TO ZOOM THROUGH BERRY

A representative from the Centurion Cycling bike race will be attending the February 15 Town Board meeting to explain a proposed major cycling event slated for Aug 7-8 and to gain Berry's cooperation.

The race is made up of three courses: a 25, a 50 and a 100-mile run. The 50 and 100-milers are planned to run through Eastern Berry. All three routes start in Middleton at the Middleton Airport.

The Greater Madison Convention & Visitors Bureau is helping North American Sports organize the event. North American Sports is focusing on bringing Centurion Cycling to the US and Canada. Ours is one of three U.S. places selected - the others are in Colorado and California.

Centurion is based on the European concept of gran fondos, held most every weekend. Traffic is restricted, technical and medical support are provided, officials time and judge the event, and food is available. Additionally, race officials will be producing an hour-long television show in partnership with Universal Sports/NBC.

GETTING TO KNOW HISTORIC BERRY – INDIAN LAKE PARK

One of the true treasures of the Town of Berry is Indian Lake County Park. It is one of the oldest inhabited areas of the Town based on evidence of a village found at the western end of the lake that dates back to 3000 BC. When the first white settlers moved into the Indian Lake area in the 1840's, they found a village of Native Americans, probably members of the Winnebago (Ho-Chunk) tribe, living along the shores of the lake. Indian burial mounds are believed to be located north of the lake, north of Hwy 19.

The first white settlers in this area were the Yankees in the 1840's, followed closely after by the Germans. One of the earliest settlers was Charles Kohlmann from Prussia, Germany. Charles moved to Springfield Corners with his wife, Wilhelmine, and their four children. Within a few days of moving to the area, Charles was robbed and murdered two miles east of Springfield Corners on his way to Milwaukee. One of Charles's sons, Friederick, bought 120 acres of land around Indian Lake from the federal government in 1850. He built a log cabin and in 1867 added the stone home, which remains there today. The log cabin has since been removed.

The second family of European descent to settle around Indian Lake was that of Friederick's daughter and her immigrant husband, John Stapelmann. This explains why some local residents today remember Indian Lake being called Stapelmann's Pond. The Stapelmann family owned the land until they sold it to Carl Ketelboeter in 1940. Six years later, Carl sold the land to his son, Paul Ketelboeter and his wife Luella, great granddaughter of Friederick Kohlmann. Paul and Luella sold 398 acres to Dane County in 1974 for use as a County Park.

GOOD NEIGHBORS AND TRAILS – A NEW YEAR, A NEW START

The first meeting of the year for the Good Neighbors Committee and the Trails Subcommittee was held on January 20th at the Village of Mazomanie Hall. There were about 25 attending.

The Trails Subcommittee started off with a short explanation of their map layout and strategies for connecting existing trails. From there, those attending were allowed to put suggestions on sticky notes and label what they would like to see included in the multipurpose trail. All types of users from horse riders, bicyclists, to snowmobilers seemed thrilled to have a chance for input.

The Trails subcommittee seems to recognize that funding for the trail may need to come from, special interest with municipalities paying for such things a signpost here or there marking routes.

Once again, the Trail Subcommittee engaged guest speakers to show support for such an ambitious undertaking as this trail system.

The GNC also had guest speakers. First was Dan Hill from UW Extension services speaking about the how and why of taking proper notes and minutes of meetings.

Second were Tom Gilbert and Pam Schuler of the National Park Service describing what could be the new state ice age park to be off of Highway 14 in the Town of Cross Plains. This presentation described what the park might look like and the public hearings that will be held on this park system. Pam Schuler described how the land acquisition process was to take place.

Due to time constraints little discussion was held on review subjects of Highway 14, high speed internet providers, and working with WI. DOT for park and ride areas.

It was announced again that the Village of Cross Plains is going to hold a public Hearing on what may be their new official village map on February 8th at 7pm in the American Legion Hall in Cross Plains. This map shows new road possibilities, where new housing developments might be located and targets where new commercial areas are planned for the future. Public comment is welcome.
