#### **BUDGET MEETING TURNOUT DISAPPOINTING**

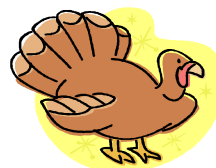

## **GOOD NEIGHBORS TAKE BUS TOUR OF HIGHWAY 14 CORRIDOR**

On October the 17<sup>th</sup>, The Good Neighbor Committee and other interested area residents embarked on a tour to study the highway corridor. The points of interest ranged from historical and environmental sites, park and ride locations, and constricting traffic locations from Middleton to Mazomanie. This first hand look brought to light many of the changes facing the corridor and a lot of the effects they will bring.

The Black Earth Creek Watershed is hugely affected by developments and road changes. This then plays along into farmland use and conservation.

The historical sites along the corridor are also protected by their associated legislations and need to be preserved.

With the planned developments in many of the communities in the corridor, and the existing environmental and historical sites, we are getting information needed to understand what will be needed for future traffic patterns. Hopefully the improvements will not be too far off.

## **GOOD NEIGHBORS CONTINUE TO TALK TRAILS**

The Trails subcommittee and the Good Neighbors Committee both had meetings October 21 in the Town of Black Earth Hall. Attendance was low.

The Trails subcommittee was not yet able to reveal their maps for showing where they think the multi purpose trail could go. Nor were they able to offer any kind of price tag for the project. The subcommittee is planning to post their maps for comments prior to its next meeting. Currently only two Subcommittee members and one engineer (hired to work with the committee on obtaining grants and coordinating planning) seem to be engaged in the effort.

All members seem to agree that for safety sake, it would be nice to get the bicycles off the narrow country roads. The snowmobilers would like to get connecting trails between their existing trails. The ATV riders are overdue for their sport. Others ask what kind of a benefit is it to all the municipalities involved? For example, the Town of Berry has one tavern/restaurant on a snowmobile route.

The question was brought up that even if all the trails were paid for by grant dollars, would the communities still want them built? The reply was that nothing is free and the cost of upkeep may be more that we can handle.

The Good Neighbors committee discussed the trails situation and the direction in which it is proceeding. The bus tour was debriefed with further ideas brought to public.

More discussion was held on the WISDot study of Highway 14. The results are in and it seems that it will take a whole meeting to go over and highlight what this means to the corridor.

The next meeting will be in the Village of Cross Plains. The exact location is to be announced. The date is November 18<sup>th</sup> 2009.

Now is the time if you are interested in either of these topics to come and voice your opinion. *-Tim Henneman*

## **RENT THE TOWN HALL FOR HOLIDAY & OTHER EVENTS**

Are you looking for a place to hold the annual family Christmas gathering, a surprise birthday party, or a high school graduation celebration? Then consider the Town of Berry town hall.

The Town hall is available to Town residents from 7:30 am to 11:00 pm any day of the week, except for periods when in use for Town business. The hall may be reserved in advance for a one-time or a recurring event expecting 50 persons by contacting the Town Clerk. If the event is expecting more than 50 people, then Town Chair approval shall be obtained prior to securing the date. The user is expected to collect and remove all trash and leave the hall in the same condition as prior to the event. Kegs are not allowed, beer and wine only. Smoking in or near the hall is also prohibited. Users must sign a Use Agreement prior to the event.

If the event is during business hours and the kitchen is not used the charge is \$20 and with kitchen use \$50. If the event is outside of business hours with no kitchen use the charge is \$50 and with kitchen use \$80.

A refundable deposit is required. This deposit is used for clean-up, repairs or replacement of items, if needed. A deposit of \$50 is required for events during business hours with the use of the kitchen. For events outside of business hours with no kitchen use the deposit is \$50 and with kitchen use \$250.

## **HUNTING SEASON DATES**

Hunters are in the woods. The Town of Berry is in the CWD Disease Eradication Zone for the 2009 hunting season. The hunting season in Berry this year extends until January 4, 2010 with these deer-hunting season dates:

Nov 21	Traditional gun deer season open.
Nov 29	Traditional gun deer season closes.
Nov 30	Muzzleloader season opens.
December 9	Muzzleloader season closes.
December 10	Late gun deer season open.
December 13	Late gun deer season closes.
December 24	Holiday firearm season opens.
January 3	Holiday firearm season closes.
January 3	Archery season closes.

These dates are advisory only; check with the State DNR for any changes.

## **DANE COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL COUNCIL VISITS TOWN PARK**

Friday, October 9, members of the Dane County Environmental Council visited Berry’s Kahl Halfway Prairie Park and saw the fruits of the \$2,959 grant they had provided.

Praising the wetland pond funded by the grant, they also complimented the Town on its healthy prairie restoration, commenting that they were surprised that many of the species had been so well established in only three years.

Council members suggested adding informative signing and offered ideas on ways to involve youth groups.

Looking across Halfway Prairie Creek and noticing crops planted close to the creek, Council members urged we convey the importance of planting prairie buffers along creeks to filter farm residue and chemicals heading toward the waters.

## **CORRECTIONS**

Last month, when reporting the status of the efforts to get high speed internet for all of Berry, we implied that TDS could block other high-speed internet servers from coming into Berry. That is not accurate.

TDS is an ILEC – Incumbent Local Exchange Carrier – registered to provide phone service to our residences. An ILEC like TDS by law must provide access and co-location services to a CLEC, a Competitive Local Exchange Carrier.

Broadband is available now in Berry in several forms and varying costs:

- Satellite - \$60 - \$200 / month offering 700Kb – 2Mb downloads and 200k -500k uploads
- Leased lines such as a T1. \$750 / month offering 1.54Mb downloads and uploads
- 3G cellular in some areas but not many. \$70/month with 700k download and 100k upload

We mentioned Sauk County is contracting with a private firm to use 911 lines for high-speed service. More specifically, the firm is looking at providing wireless telephone and/or wireless Internet service by sharing towers with the county 911 system and other cell phone companies, sending data over the county fiber optic cables and cables owned by Merrimac-based Merr.com.

**TIPS FROM THE WISCONSIN  
GARDENING CALENDAR  
NOVEMBER, 2009**

**FIRST WEEK**

The most important **lawn fertilizer application** of the year is the one in late October/early November. Apply 1/2 to 1 lb. of nitrogen per thousand square feet. Select a product that has more slow-release nitrogen than fast release nitrogen.

**Fertilize trees and shrubs** that showed signs of stress this year such as early fall color or smaller, paler or fewer leaves. Using a fertilizer with 12 - 20 percent nitrogen, deciduous trees need 1 - 2 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. of area over the root zone. Evergreen trees only need one pound. Give shrubs growing alone 4 oz. per foot of height or spread, whichever is greater. Shrubs grouped in beds need 2 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. of bed area.

**Cole crops** like Brussels sprouts, cabbage, broccoli and kale are made sweeter by frost so harvest them as long as possible.

**Spring flowering bulbs** can still be planted as long as the ground is not frozen.

Pot up some spring flowering **bulbs for indoor forcing**. Crocus and hyacinth bulbs stored for 8 weeks in the back of your refrigerator will produce blooms three weeks after they are brought into a warmer room. Narcissus (daffodils) and tulips require 12 - 14 weeks of cold treatment and should be potted up before chilling.

**Check houseplants for insects** that may have come indoors as you brought the plants inside.

**Outdoor planters, hanging baskets, and window boxes** should be emptied and washed thoroughly with soap and a mild bleach solution before storing for next year. Store plastic, clay and concrete containers where they will not get wet or freeze.

**SECOND WEEK**

Lawns left too tall over the winter encourage disease problems like snow mold and tunneling of meadow mice. **Mow one final time** at 2 - 2 1/2".

**Prune everbearing raspberries** if you did not do so after this fall's harvest. If you cut or mow all canes to the ground now there will be no spring harvest but a much larger fall harvest next year. It also reduces insect and disease problems.

**Water all needle and broadleaf evergreens** one last time before the ground freezes since winter wind and sun will continue to demand water from these plants through their leaves all winter. Excess water loss can lead to "winter burn" or death.

**Amaryllis bulbs** that have rested for at least 10 weeks can be repotted, watered and brought into a bright room to produce flowers for the holidays.

**THIRD WEEK**

**Wrap the trunks of young and tender trees** to prevent sunscald. Paper tree wrap can prevent the rapid temperature changes in the bark that cause frost cracking and sunscald. They do not provide protection from the chewing of mice, voles, rabbits and other pests. For this use plastic or wire applied at least 1 - 2 feet higher up the trunk than the expected snow level. Clear away weeds, tall grass and leaves from the trunk area to reduce nesting sites for these pests, too.

**Stop fertilizing indoor plants** now since they will use less water and nutrients due to the lower light levels.

**Keep flowering cactuses well watered** and out of drafts. Avoid moving them while in flower since this may cause them to drop buds.

**Cut down and discard asparagus stems** and leaves as soon as they have yellowed completely. Removing these from the garden reduces disease and insect problems next year.

**FOURTH WEEK**

**Mulch** layers can be applied to perennial vegetables and flowers as soon as the top 1 - 2 inches of the ground are frozen. This includes leeks, carrots and potatoes. Roses, chrysanthemums and other tender perennials, too. Apply at least 2 - 4 inches of mulch to help moderate temperature fluctuations that can heave plant crowns out of the ground as it freezes and thaws during late winter and early spring.

**Tender hybrid roses can be caged** in chicken wire and mounded with soil now. Allow soil to freeze then stuff the cages with dry fallen leaves. Stems do not need to be cut back until next spring.

**Root crops** are insulated from frost by the ground so they can be left in the garden and dug as needed. A thick layer of mulch will prolong the harvest. You may even find yourself shoveling off the snow to gather a few last carrots, potatoes, leeks, Brussels spouts and parsnips.

**Delay all unnecessary pruning until late winter** or early spring just before budbreak since wounds will heal most quickly when the tree or shrub is growing most vigorously. Elms, maples, birches and black walnut can be pruned after the sap has stopped "rising". Sap running from wounds does not harm the tree.—[www.wisconline.com](http://www.wisconline.com)
